WATER RESOURCES

Stratmoor Hills relies on snowpack in the Colorado Rockies to provide us with a reliable drinking water supply. Our primary source of water comes from the Frying Pan Arkansas (Fry-Ark) water supply. Much of this water comes from the Arkansas River and is stored in Pueblo Reservoir. From there, it is pumped to the Fountain Valley Water Authority water treatment plant (Just South of Fountain) where it is treated to meet all Safe Drinking Water Act standards. The water is then pumped to the District's water storage reservoirs so that it is available to meet the needs of our customers.

Our second source of water comes from the Widefield Aquifer. The District has three wells that are used primarily in the summer to meet the higher water demands. With the discovery of Perfluorinated Compounds (PFCs) in the aquifer, the district conducts extensive sampling of our well water to ensure the concentration of these compounds remains below the United States Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) health advisory level. Please note, a more specific name for these compounds is Per- and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances (PFAS). Even though our untreated source water does not exceed any health advisory levels for these unregulated contaminants, the District will continue to provide Ion Exchange treatment at our well sites to ensure our drinking water remains safe. All of our finished water sampling results have shown that Ion Exchange treatment removes PFCs to levels below detection limits.

The District is currently working with Forsgren and Associates on the design of a Centralized Water Treatment facility that will allow us to meet all of our water demands from our groundwater source alone if necessary. The design of the plant will take several months to complete, and we hope to start construction of the treatment plant shortly thereafter. A grant provided by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment will pay for all of the design and engineering costs.

With a combination of groundwater and surface water resources, the District will always be able to provide our customers with safe and reliable drinking water.

If you are interested in volunteering to educate people about home fire safety and install free smoke alarms just be at the Fire Station by 9 AM. The more volunteers we have the more homes will be made safer.
